

# Wonder of Wonders; Miracle of Miracles by Fr. Randy+

We are now moving into the season of the days following Pentecost—remember the day when we hear the story recounting Jesus' disciples received the gift of the Holy Spirit. There are two accountings of this miraculous story—one in John's gospel and the other in Acts 2.

In John 20, the disciples are gathered together behind locked doors, as they were afraid that those same people who put Jesus to death might now be after them. Without warning or using the door, Jesus appears in the room and is standing among them. "Peace be with you," he says. He shows them the marks in his hands and side, wounds from his crucifixion. Jesus then breathes on them, and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit." Finally, along with the commission to go into the world, granting them the power of forgive people's sins, or to refuse them forgiveness. It is a placid and gentle meeting—terrifying, but not overwhelming.

The second narrative in Luke's version of this day in Acts, it happens many days later, after Jesus' ascension into heaven. There is nothing gentle or soothing about this story. Jesus' friends and disciples are gathered in a room,

praying and waiting for the gift of "power" that Jesus has promised them (Acts 1:8). Suddenly, they are overwhelmed by "a sound like the rush of a violent wind." I can only imagine that sound—much like we have experienced in the path of a tornado or hurricane or blizzard—terrifying, indeed! And that was not enough! They see "divided tongues, as of fire" appearing on each other's heads and they begin speaking in other languages, testifying about God' mighty deeds of power in languages they had never learned!

I mean, that's crazy, right? Imagine the chaos. What am I saying? How is this happening? It must be a miracle!



It's not surprising that the resultant cacophony of each of these wild events draw a crowd. The people who witness this event are amazed and probably a little bit frightened by the spectacle. They likely make their way to the focal place in their lives—the Temple—where the enemies of Jesus and his followers are no doubt gathered. But with the power of the Holy Spirit, the disciples and followers are absolutely *fearless!* The power of the Holy Spirit and the words spoken in eloquent testimony to the power and goodness of God are unstoppable—over three thousand persons are joined to the Church that day.

Wonder of Wonders; Miracle of Miracles! There are two miracles here—and I'm not referring to the sound of the rushing wind, or the tongues of fire, or the speaking in different languages. The first is that the Church has begun to testify out in the world, and the second is that the world responds with repentance and faith. God is at work!

People are no longer afraid! They cannot be hushed! There is a fiery urgency in their proclamation!

And, what is our proper response as we bear witness to this Pentecost? That same message has a powerful, life-changing effect on all of us who hear it. "What shall we do?" How can we experience what the disciples and the early followers of Jesus experienced? What can we do to be similarly transformed, to be made strong and to be filled with a passionate love for the Most High? Well—we're generally not that adventurous most of the time; we don't like not being in control; and we appreciate a quiet, calm, and orderly atmosphere. We are Episcopalians, after all.

And yet, perhaps, I believe we need a good windstorm to shake things up. We could use some stirring up, if we hope influence our generation and those around us. Do we *DARE* to ask God to pour out the Holy Spirit on each of us and on the Church with *power and might*, as God did for these early believers? Would we have the courage to pray God to *unleash the Spirit* on us, even if it leads to chaos and disorder? Would we be willing for God to set us *aflame* with passion for the Gospel?

Is it risky? You bet! Do we DARE?

"The Spirit blows where it will." There's really no telling what will happen if we DARE to ask. Randy+
